Expectations for the Week

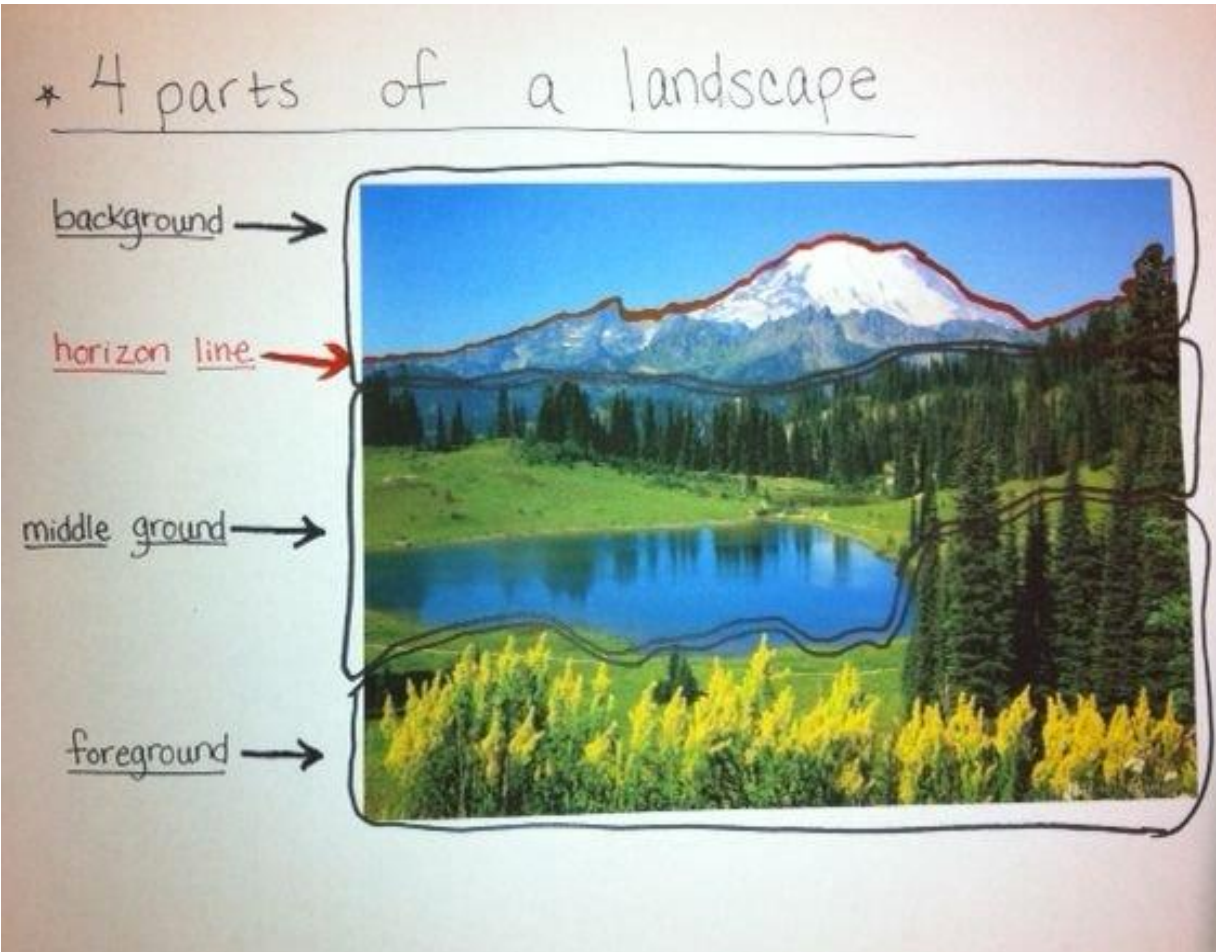

Therefore, your art teacher requests that you give your best effort in completing at least one of the four choices in a week's time but there is no requirement for students to submit evidence of completion to the art teacher.

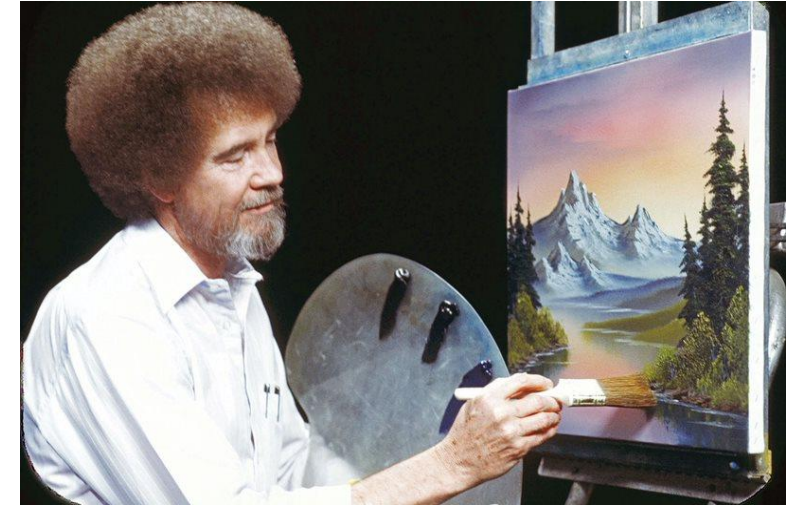
Theme for the Week: Landscapes



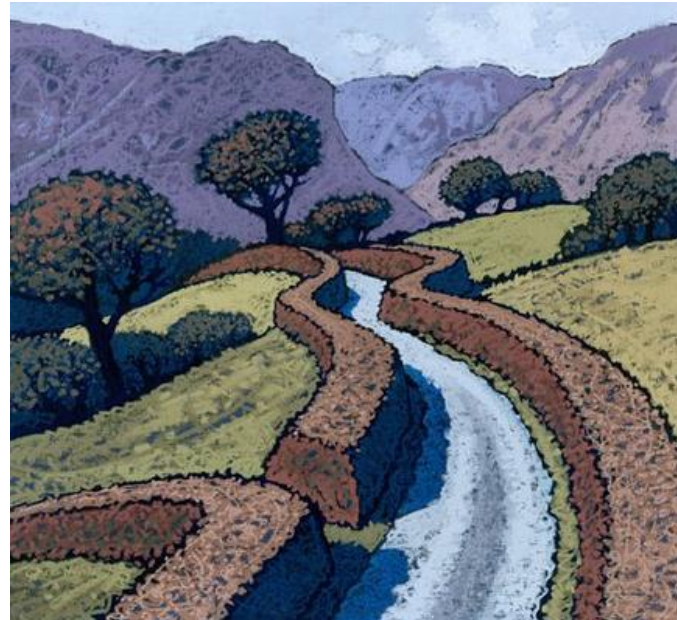
- Landscapes represent the element of Space by creating the illusion of depth where objects appear close and far away. Landscapes represent outdoor settings.
- Objects that appear smaller, less detailed, and toward the top of the artwork and farther from the viewer are in the background.
- The line where the sky meets the ground is called the horizon line.
- Objects that appear in the middle "layer" of the artwork are in the middle ground.
- Objects that appear larger, more detailed, and toward the bottom of the artwork and closer to the viewer are in the foreground/"front".

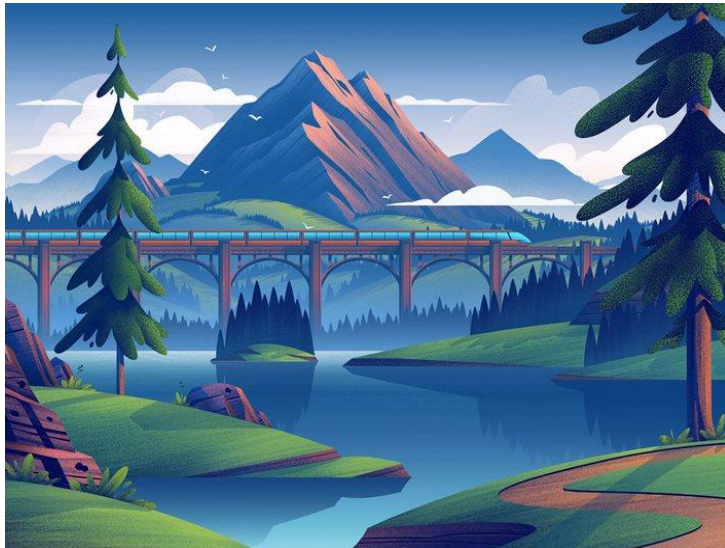

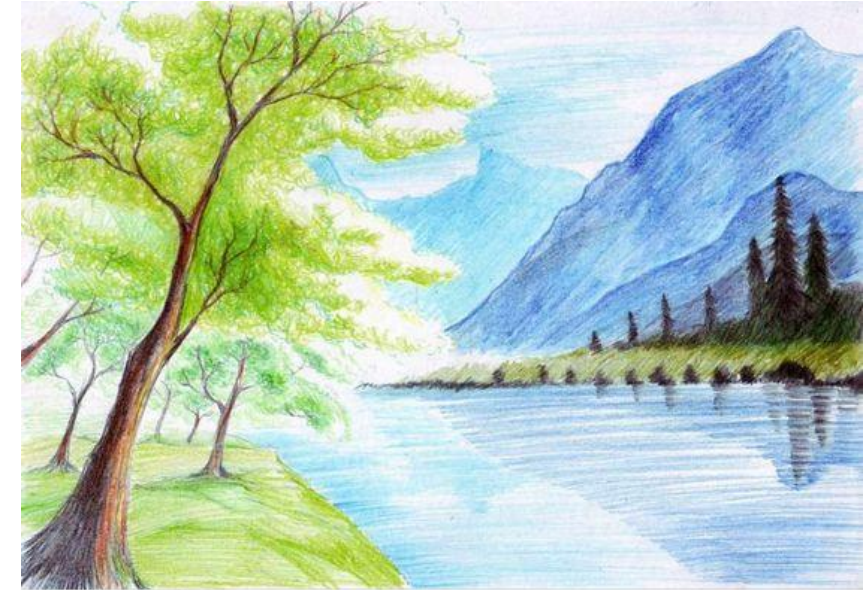
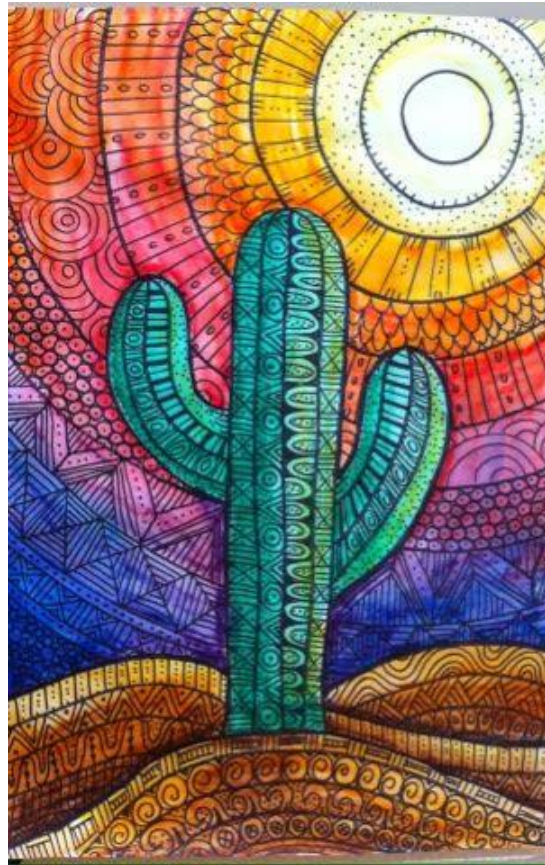

Some examples are below, but these are just to help you get started and inspired!





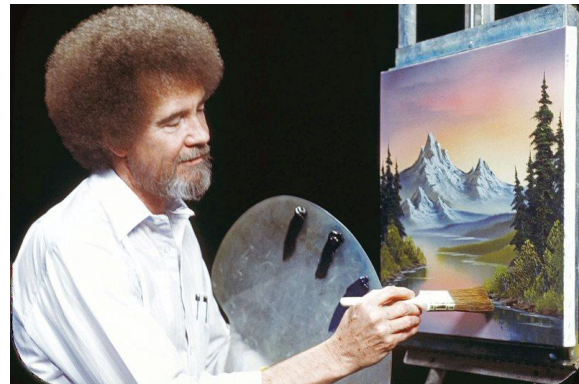

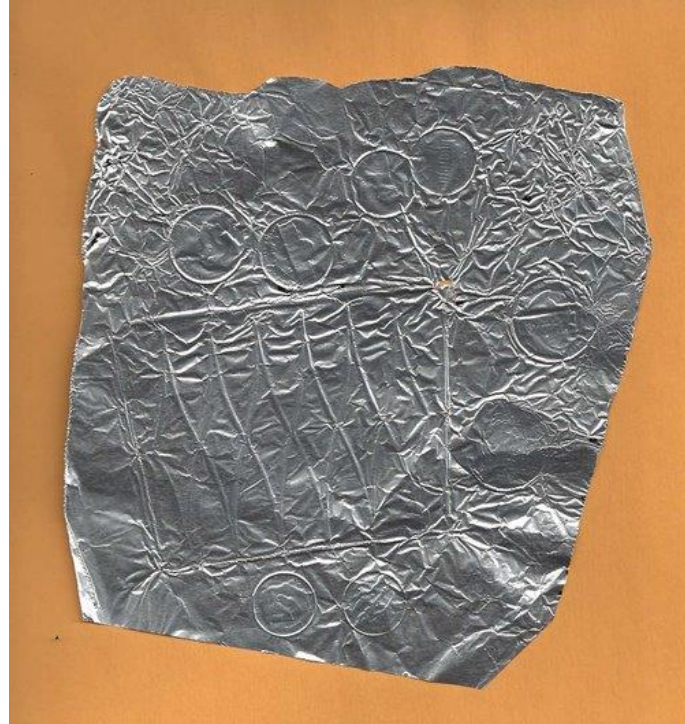

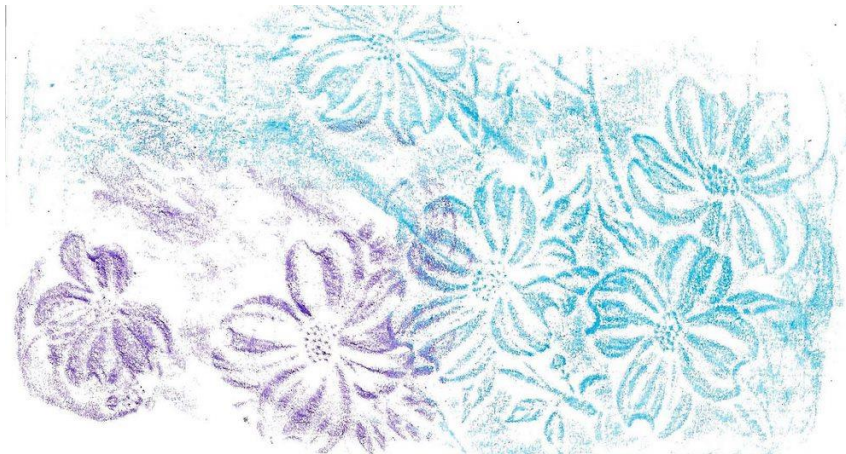




#3 Mixed Media Choice
